

Richard House In 2020

In view of the Government restrictions announced on 31 October 2020, we understand the MW The Grand Master, His Royal Highness The Duke of Kent, KG, directed that all Lodge meetings in England would be suspended with effect from 12.01 a.m. on Thursday 5 November until such time as those restrictions are lifted.

The Coronavirus outbreak provided society with its most testing time since World War 2; and yet the Masonic community was at our side. The amazing support shown by the Freemasons has ensured our vital work has continued throughout the ongoing crisis enabling us to achieve some incredible milestones.



The support from the Masonic community year on year helps to help our vital services running. I recently spoke to one of our parents about this and they said -

Mark Masons' Hall, nestled in the bosom of the fashionable St James' area of the West end, is home to ten of the 'Progressive Orders' in Freemasonry as well as being one of the main masonic venues in the capital.

Each of the Orders has something different to offer the Brother seeking further enlightenment. Still, they all have one thing in common – a fundamental ethic of helping others by their charitable activities.

In March, Mark Masons from across the country celebrated The Mark Benevolent Fund's partnership with Lifelites which saw grants distributed to hospices caring for disabled children and those with life-limited conditions to purchase specialist assistive technology packages. Two London hospices benefitted from the partnership, one of which was Richard House Children's Hospice. The hospice was later fortunate to receive £6,875 towards PPE and equipment costs for Hospice at Home.

Lucy Welford, Trust & Foundations Manager, at Richard House said, "We are extremely grateful to have the support of the Mark Benevolent Fund through what has arguably been our toughest year yet. Their generosity has meant we can keep on providing the best possible care to life-limited children in the community and, with Lifelites, brightening their days with fantastic resources and technology.
