St Piran's Lodge, No. 1367, under the authority of the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of England and Wales and Districts and Lodges Overseas and the Provincial Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of Cornwall. Date of Warrant 5th November 1969 and consecrated on 31st January 1970.

The Sponsoring Lodge for St Piran's No. 1367 was Fortitude No. 78. The first Master was W.Bro. J.W. Batchelor the then owner of the Ponsmere Hotel, Perranporth, where many happy Mark Provincial Balls were held over the years. A year following the consecration of St Piran's Lodge the annual Provincial Grand Lodge meeting was held under the banner of St Piran's, which happened again, on a further 4 occasions. According to Keystone Online St Piran's has a current membership of 22 and 4 of them have Grand Rank. Amongst the 8 Provincial Officers there are two Active Officers, who are the current Active Provincial Grand Senior Warden, W. Bro Graham Jose and the Provincial Deputy Grand Director of Ceremonies, W. Bro Adrian Ashley Waters. The remaining membership consist of 2 Worshipful Brothers and 8 Brothers. 9 of the members were Advanced at St Piran's and the remaining 13 have all joined the lodge.

In every Mark lodge the most important assets are its members. When we visit lodges in any Order, we see old friends and new faces. We listen to their meetings and how they may differ from our own. We catch up with friends and learn about those we have not met before. 5 of the St Piran's Mark Men have taken the time to write a bit about themselves for you to read and enjoy:

W. Bro. John H Thomas, Worshipful Master

I was Worshipful Master of St. Piran's Mark Lodge No1367 in 2018/19 and then again in 2020/21. Because of the Covid suspension of meetings it appears that a third term has just begun. During the associated lockdowns, I've indulged in my passion of making wine, brewing beer and most importantly "drinking it". Not meeting over the last twelve months has bought it home to me and my wife how important Freemasonry in general really is. It has given us a wonderful social life and we have made some very good friends. Visiting many Mark lodges has also opened up to me new friendships. We at St. Piran's Mark pride ourselves in being a very happy and welcoming lodge who take the ceremonies seriously and then when the lodge is closed, we then relax and enjoy the rest of the evening, usually at the bar. It has been muted by some brethren that we should be called a "Drinking Lodge", can't understand why myself!!! It is a pleasure to be a member St. Piran's Mark, part of a good team and Freemasonry in general and I hope to be for many years to come. Feel free to take a look at some of my brews:









Bro. Dave Nicholls (Steward)

It was the 18th of March 2018 that I was initiated into Craft Masonry, joining St Piran's Lodge in Perranporth and seizing the chance to get involved in any opportunity which presented itself. One such opportunity which was put to me was the idea of joining the St Piran's Mark Lodge, so in November 2019, I joined. As misfortune would have it, the only meeting I've attended at St Piran's Mark was my own Advancement (I've been to see another one in Penryn since), largely due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, and in part due to missing the February 2020 Installation meeting due to be in Snowdonia on holiday. The Snowdonia holiday was one built around walking, something which I truly love, and can be found doing most often around various places in Cornwall. My love stems from a young life spent outdoors, seizing the opportunity to undertake my Bronze, Silver, and Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award's, as well as attending the Outward Bound Centre in Fort William for 3 weeks, and then their Ullswater centre for a further week, undertaking an outdoor leadership qualification. Now, alongside my day job as a teacher, I am a qualified DofE assessor up to Gold level, so spend my free weekends (when we're allowed) supervising groups around various places in Cornwall, Devon and all the way up in the Lake District.

Cornwall provides us with some phenomenal areas of beauty, and in 2016 I took advantage of the Summer holiday which teachers are afforded, and walked from Newquay, back to Newquay, along the South West Coast Path. Setting out from our home in Newquay, I walked with my rucksack on my back, each day covering anywhere up to 20 miles of Coast Path, whilst taking in the stunning surroundings which sit on our doorstep. The stretch from Rock to Tintagel and then Tintagel onwards to Crackington Haven is particularly dramatic, with long climbs up steep slopes and rocky outcrops to negotiate, however the views it affords soon ease the pain in the legs and sore feet and show Cornwall in its most beautiful and dramatic light. Beyond Morwenstow, Marsland Mouth is reached, marking the point at which Cornwall leads into Devon, with a small sign marking the border as you wander down a path towards the bay. From there it's a right turn (to put it simply) to follow the footpath on to Launceston, and then beyond down the Tamar Valley – another wonderful walk which is well worth a visit, particularly the section around Tavistock.

Eventually, 18 days after walking out of the front door and having negotiated the South Coast and what remained of the North, I walked back around the corner from the main road towards our home. In those 18 days I covered around 364 miles, climbed the equivalent of 2 Mt Everest's in altitude gain, broke 1 tent, assisted 2 people in various states of distress, and consumed more Fruit Pastilles than any one man should consume in such a short space of time, however I made it.

This walk was before I had become a Mason, and so the monies which I raised were for other charities, however at some point in the near(ish) future, my plan is to complete the walk once again as a training walk, before undertaking a walk from Sword Beach in Normandy, to Berlin in Germany, retracing the route which my Grandfather (who was also a Mason) took during World War Two, hopefully with the aim of raising funds for the Masonic Charitable Foundation. For now though, particularly during the Covid-19 pandemic, my boots are set to one side, biding their time until the next opportunity comes around.



W. Bro. Paul Nicholls - Secretary

I was Initiated into St Piran's Craft Lodge in 2009 and Advanced into St Piran's Mark Lodge in 2012. The Mark was my first Progressive Order, followed by Fortitude RAM in 2016 and Royal Cornubian Chapter in 2018.

I was Worshipful Master of St Piran's Mark in 2019/2020, (my first Chair) and I should currently be in the Chair of St Piran's Craft, but Covid has put paid to that until next year.

I've worked in the construction industry since I left school. I started out as an apprentice mason, (so you could say I've been an operative mason) and I've worked with brick and stone and have built a few arches with keystones in my time. I think this may be why I feel so 'in tune' with the Mark Degree.

During my year in the Chair of St Piran's, I set myself a target of visiting every Mark Lodge in the Province. It took a lot of planning - taking work, family commitments and attendance of other Lodges/Degrees into consideration, but I did it, and even managed a visit up to England – St John Lodge No 50 in Plymouth. I made a total of 51 visits during my year in the Chair, 24 of them to Installation meetings. Last year I was hoping to get to the Installations I missed while in the Chair, but Covid put paid to that as well.

While in the Chair, my main travelling companion was W.Bro. Adrian Waters, our Almoner, although I'm sure most people will know him as the whispering Provincial Deputy Grand Director of Ceremonies. Adrian acted a guide to find some of the more 'hidden' lodge buildings, for example St Ives and Looe. There's never a dull moment while you're in his company, and I thoroughly enjoyed travelling with him, picking him up from deepest darkest Zelah on countless occasions. For some strange reason, the passenger side tyres of my car wore out very quickly though... I Installed my successor (W. Bro. John Thomas) in February last year. I don't think at the time any of us could have imagined that we wouldn't meet again in person for well over a year. The first suspension of face-to-face meetings came into force on March 17th, 2020. I remember the date well, as we were due to meet that very evening. As I'd moved from the Masters Chair to the Secretaries table, I had to ring around the few of us who were going to attend the meeting to make sure they knew of the suspension, and also to cancel the pasties!

Since then, it feels like I've sent hundreds of emails (I'm sure the members would say it feels like thousands) but have yet to actually sit at the Secretaries table during a meeting. Last year, from what would have been our May meeting, I hosted fortnightly Zoom social meetings to try and keep everyone in touch. This year I'm hosting them monthly as there are now so many other Masonic events online which Brethren can join. We have recently held a Virtual Business Meeting on what would have been our Installation date, fortunately we're used to using Zoom! I'm sure I'm not alone in saying I can't wait to get back to our meetings, and also to get back out visiting. I'm also sure at some point, I'll be heading back into deepest darkest Zelah, fresh set of passenger side tyres on my car....

W. Bro. Nigel Newberry P.Prov.G.Stwd.

I joined the craft lodge at St Piran's in my 50's and was happy to be invited to join the local Mark Lodge, my ceremony of Advancement was performed by the Provincial Grand Master and his team. I will always remember entering a packed lodge ablaze with the colour of the banner and aprons of the distinguished guests.

At the end of my second year as Master of the Lodge I tragically lost my wife to pneumonia. My daughters live up country, as we say, so I was left very alone. My Masonic friends came to my rescue, with Mike Barnes persuasion and Adrian Waters help with transport I started to attend meetings which began the rebuilding of my life.

I was lucky to meet a lady who had gone through a similar experience and we became close and later married. She had connections in Cyprus and prior to the pandemic we were living over there for up to nine months a year and in Saltash for the rest.

In Cyprus I discovered that a neighbour Spencer Greenwood was a member of Apollo Craft Lodge and Kypros Mark. I joined both lodges.

I was honoured when offered the post of Provincial Grand Steward in Cornwall but also concerned as I knew I would only be in Cornwall for a few months that year. The Provincial office confirmed that I could still take this position. I'm just sorry I could not get to visit lodges here that year. (continued over)

I did attend all the Cyprus Lodges and presented the Deputy District Grand Master Eric Williams, an expat Cornishman, with a copy of our Mark History Book.

In late 2019 to try and stimulate growth in Mark members, the Cyprus District formed a demonstration team to perform an Advancement ceremony at each of the lodges, I was pleased to accept the role of Senior Warden and in February 2020 we performed a ceremony at St Paul's Lodge in Limassol.

It has been an honour to represent St Piran's and Cornwall.

Living in Saltash I am now able to walk to my local lodge and when we resume our Masonic lives I hope to join there.

The friendships formed through masonry have added to my life and help get me through dark times, I look forward to being able to renew old friendships and hopefully making new ones.



W.Bro Robert Hawke PGStB.

According to my mother, I had an interesting start to life, being born at 1.30am on the trolley going into Kandang Kerbau Maternity Hospital in Singapore. I believe the hospital was at one time the largest dedicated Maternity Hospital in the world!

Until the age of 8, I grew up in the gilded life of the Colony of Singapore, we only left as Singapore was going to join the Federated States of Malaya and my father was informed by the Prime Minister to be, Lee Kuan Yew, who my father knew well, that he would be required to take up Citizenship, which he was not prepared to do. The timing, 1959, coincided with my elder sister needing to go to upper school and there wasn't an English speaking one in Singapore at the time. The only upper school available was the American one, which only taught USA matters. Our mother refused to send either of us to boarding school back in England so home we came. Another coincidence was that my father had been "headhunted" by an Engineering Company in England.

The reason we were in Singapore was because my father had been posted there just before the surrender. He was in the Royal Corps of Signals as a despatch rider. With usual Army efficiency, when he arrived, all the motorbikes had been sent to India and replaced by lorries. My father being the only one who had actually driven a lorry, he had to teach all the despatch riders how to drive!

After the surrender to the Japanese, like all prisoners he was put to work, as all the service records were available to the Japanese, they found out he was a Laundry Machinery Engineer and sent him to work at the Singapore Steam Laundry. The laundry was being managed by a Dane, Mr Standing, and as then Denmark had been taken into Germany, the Japanese didn't bother him. Soon however, like many of the Allied Forces there, my father was told he would be sent to the Burma Railway. Mr Standing told him that if he survived, there was a job waiting for him.

Well, my father did survive the "Death Railway" and on repatriation to Southampton, he weighed less than 6 stone. At Southampton, he was turned away from the house of my Great Aunt (husband of a Navy Regular), as she didn't recognise him. He was able to write a diary of his life in the camps, which has since been transcribed (I have a readable copy) which is now in the Imperial War Museum. The diary was kept in several pieces by fellow prisoners in case of a search by the Japanese, the possession of one was a sentence of death. After the tropics, my father took a look at grey & cold England and with encouragement from my mother, left for Singapore. As he was considered part of the reconstruction team, he was flown out there by Sunderland flying boat. The trip lasted only a few days, rather than weeks at sea. Six months later, my mother followed (by sea). The final trip home was called the "long way". Via Hong Kong, Japan where we were treated like Royalty, but none of our guides would speak English, which was not a surprise as they had obviously been told not to hold a conversation with our father!

By the time we left, my father had become a Member of Sir Stamford Raffles Lodge No.7444 EC. My Godfather was a Scottish Mason, but the least said about that the better!

I became a Freemason on the 16th of March 1981 in Phoenix Lodge of Honor and Prudence No. 331, then meeting at St Mary's House in Truro, I'm now the Senior Past Master which seems odd! I became a Member of Royal Cornubian Chapter No. 331.


In 1984, I was the Founding Secretary of Cornish Ashlar Lodge No. 9446 the Masonic Study Lodge, now meeting at St Germans. I am now the Senior Past Master and only remaining Founder along with our Honorary Member, W. Bro. Ralph Olds.

I joined Restormel Preceptory of Knights Templar at Hayle in 1985 and later became a Founder of St John of Jerusalem No.611 in Newquay. I also was a member of Duchy Chapter No. 289 Rose Croix.

In the Mark, I became a member of Fortitude No. 78 in 1986, a joining member of St Piran's No. 1367, Fortitude Lodge of Royal Ark Mariners No. 78 in 2010. I am also in Lyver Ha Pluven Mark Lodge No. 1884 and Edwin Perry Morgan Lodge No. 1632. It took me a long time to "settle" into the Mark degree, but now it's my favourite along with Royal Ark Mariners.

I feel honoured to have edited and written the 150th History of the Mark Degree in Cornwall. It seemed a daunting task, but as I progressed it, I realised how exceptional the Degree is in Cornwall. I have made a lot of friends across the County, more so than in any other degree.

Interestingly, the only degree I have not been in the Chair of was Rose Croix, probably because my ritual skills are not that good!

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OUR LODGE

Boscawen Lodge of Mark Master Masons (MMM) No: 101 was granted its warrant on the 18th April, 1868 and was the fifth Mark Lodge created in the Province of Cornwall.

Boscawen Lodge of MMM No: 101 held its first meeting and was Consecrated at Chacewater, Nr. Truro on the 6th May, 1868.

The Lodge being opened in due form by the Worshipful Master (Acting) Worshipful Brother T. Chirjwin (Prov.G.S.W.) called on Worshipful Brother Hughan the Provincial Grand Secretary, who had been deputed

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by the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of England and Wales to read the Warrant, which having been done the Lodge formed into a Past Masters Board and Worshipful Brother Ninnis was duly installed as the first Worshipful Master of the Boscawen Lodge of Mark Master Masons No: 101.

Amazingly, membership of Boscawen Mark Lodge continued to grow even through the turmoil of both World War One & World War Two. Information taken from the Cornwall Masonic Directory 1953 - 1954 (As it was then called) shows the membership of the Lodge at Ninety-Seven members.

When considering the economic effects World War Two had on the World, this was quite a remarkable size of membership.

However, looking at Craft Lodges from the same time period, membership for some Craft Lodges exceeded Two hundred members, a staggering number, when compared to current Lodge memberships.

SESQUICENTENARY YEAR 2018


During 2018 Boscawen Lodge of MMM No: 101 celebrated our 150th milestone year, with our Sesquicentenary Meeting.

Tony's talks and articles combine historical analysis with an understanding of organisational development to promote a forward-thinking approach to Freemasonry, based on the evolution of our Lodge practices while retaining our fundamental meaning and purpose.



Worshipful Brother Tony Harvey is a Grand Officer in the Craft, Royal Arch and Mark Masonry and also in two other Orders within English Freemasonry.

Professionally, Tony is a coach, speaker and a consultant specialising in leadership, change and organisational development and has managed his own practice for the last twenty-five years. His published books and articles focus on his own model of personal and organisational change, the Success Cycle.

As well as holding degrees in psychology & education and in management, Tony is a Member of the Royal Historical Society and the British Psychological Society (MBPsS) and a Fellow of the Society for Education & Training (FSET), the Learning & Performance Institute (FLPI), the Institute of Leadership &
